Dear Parents,

How many times have you found yourself saying he or she looks beautiful? Or that meal was beautiful or even that goal he or she scored was beautiful?

I, like many of you, probably say it without even thinking about it. Each and every day our media post thousands of images of both men and women that they describe as beautiful. They are of course only providing an opinion of their physical beauty. Perhaps they are equally beautiful on the inside. Sports commentators in search of the dramatic will often resort to describing the play or the team as beautiful to watch.

One of my favourite stories, that taught many of us a lesson, took place on a British Talent Show in 2009 (Britain's Got Talent). Susan Boyle a 47-year-old lady who had only ever performed for small groups stood on stage. Judges and members of the audience could be seen pulling faces that suggested what could this lady possibly offer. Her performance of "I Dreamed a Dream" was the beginning of her now successful international career and yet many had prejudged her as a "no-hoper" based on her looks and persona.

In that famous fable "The Ugly Duckling" we are taught that sometimes we need to wait for the beauty to blossom. It is well known that Albert Einstein failed 100's of times before he "discovered" many of his theories on science.

In our school community, and the wider community, there are possibly two or three Susan Boyle's, "ugly ducklings" and Einsteins hidden from our immediate view. I wonder ... Do we never forgive "some people" for a past action? Do we "forget" to smile at "some people" because we don't know them or we don't like the way they treated our child or me? Do we think less of "some people" because of what they are wearing or the way they look?

Or...

Do we nurture the beauty of "all people" by being positive with our body and verbal language? Are we the one person who will inspire those "some peoples" to achieve great deeds? I wonder if our smiles will change their day? I wonder do I look at them and see the beauty inside?

One of the greatest messages the bible tells us is how Jesus treated the "weak, the lame, the poor, the outcast and underprivileged". Indeed Jesus is still the inspiration and role model of how to treat all people.

Scratch the surface this week and remember that all of us were born beautiful, we may sometimes not share our inner beauty but all of us have a responsibility to nurture and inspire every person to be beautiful. None of us is as important as all of us. We all have the capacity to turn others' days and indeed lives around by the way we treat one another. Beautiful people are everywhere; we are all lucky to be a part of a school community where there are endless examples of this.

Meals are very important events. Not only do we physically need food and drink to keep ourselves alive, but we use meals to mark occasions and celebrate events: birthdays; weddings; dates; achievements; disappointments; reunions. Stories are told; memories shared; the food is appreciated and more often than not there's a drink to accompany the meal. Jesus had many meals with his disciples and friends, but only a few meals are written about in the Gospels. His Last Supper had a special significance. Not only was it his final meal, but it coincided with the great Jewish celebration of liberation called the Passover. During this meal Jesus gave the ritual bread and wine a new meaning, that of his own life. When he was no longer physically present with the disciples they were to continue to gather around a table, to share bread and wine, and by his words, 'This is my body; this is my blood,' he promised that in these gatherings he will be present. Teams can nominate for one of the following challenges: Language/Literature; Science/Engineering; Media Communication or Social Science. This year's Regional Opti-MINDS event will be held on Sunday 29 August.

Students interested in registering for the Opti-MINDS Challenge must be willing to give up some lunchbreaks and meet afterschool and weekends during the 6 week preparation time, leading up to the presentation day, Sunday 29 August. All students must be available for the whole day of Sunday 29 August.

WELLBEING AT EMMANUEL

The wellbeing of all students, staff and parents in our Emmanuel community is of the utmost importance. Our school Wellbeing Committee meets fortnightly, and has been analysing the data collected from the Be You surveys our Year 4, 5 and 6 students completed earlier this year.

Over the coming weeks we will be sharing some of the findings of this survey. It is pleasing to see that the vast majority of statements were very favourably received by our students, such as:

- 94% of our students believe that "Both my teachers and my family want me to be the best I can be."
- 92% of our students believe that "My teacher encourages me to treat others with respect."

At the other end of the scale, only 44% of students agreed with the statement "My family often asks me to share with them how I can improve at school." This is something for us all as teachers and parents to consider. This reminded me of a time when my children were young, and they'd often come home saying that they "did nothing" at school when asked. Often the conversation between students and parents ends there. The Nothing Poem is something I'd like to share for all of us to ponder.....

*When children come home at the end of the day,

And the answer they give makes you sigh with dismay
"Nothing, I did nothing today."
Perhaps nothing means that I observed a bird's nest,
