FEAST DAY

On the 6 August each year the Church celebrates the *Feast of The Transfiguration of the Lord*. The Transfiguration is our school feast day and each year we gather to remember and celebrate that '*God is with us*.'

DANIEL MORCOMBE CHILD SAFETY CURRICULUM

Throughout this term, our school will be implementing the Daniel Morcombe Child Safety Curriculum with students in all year levels. The curriculum is based on principles of best practice in child safety education and centres around three key messages: **Recognise, React** and **Report**. Through a series of lessons, students will learn how to recognise, react and report when they are unsafe or find themselves in situations that can have a significant detrimental effect on their physical, psychological or emotion



that can have a significant detrimental effect on their physical, psychological or emotional wellbeing.

It is important that these key safety messages are reinforced, both at school and home. I encourage you, wherever possible, to talk with your child about safety to help them stay safe now and in the future.

ACARA Item Trial 2021 - testing NAPLAN questions

Your child's school has been selected by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) to participate in this year's Item Trial. The purpose of the Item Trial is to evaluate *potential* NAPLAN test questions ('items') for use in future NAPLAN tests.

ACARA appreciates the participation of your child in the Item Trial. Your child's involvement and the results from the trial will help ACARA ensure that NAPLAN tests are valid, reliable and fair for all students.

About the Item Trial

- The Item Trial is being held in approximately 500 schools across Australia between **Monday 26 July** and **Friday 13 August 2021**.
- Schools are carefully selected to ensure that a range of student backgrounds and abilities is represented.
- The Item Trial is about testing the questions, not about testing your child or their ability. Your child's results are not reported.
- Your child will sit two Item Trial tests. These will be, for example, a Reading and a Numeracy
 test, a Writing and a Conventions of Language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) test, or two
 Writing tests.
- The tests will be administered at the school by trained test supervisors. Where tests are
 online, your child will use the device that they use for everyday classroom activities, such as
 a desk-based computer, a laptop or a tablet.
- All selected students are expected to participate in the Item Trial, unless they have been
 exempted or withdrawn from NAPLAN tests. If you have questions about your child's
 participation, please raise these with your school.

NATIONALLY CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA ON STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY

Attached to this week's Newsletter is an information sheet for all parents explaining Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on Students with Disability. All schools in Australia are required to participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability.

All Australian governments have agreed to work together to implement a new annual national data collection on school students with disability. This data collection process has been phased in over a three year period from 2013-2015.

In 2015, the first full national collection of data on school students with disability occurred in all Australian schools. From then on, this data collection occurs in every school, every year, along with other school data collections.

What does disability mean?

This national data collection reinforces the actions required of schools under the National Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005. The significant change with this collection is the use of a broader definition of disability than the one currently used to identify and allocate resources in educational systems. As a result, of this shift in the definition we believe that more students in our community, may be considered eligible for identification in the data collection. These laws mean that schools and education systems are required to make, where needed, reasonable adjustments for students with disability.


