It was a cold Sunday in Winter. The church's parking lot was filling up quickly. I noticed as I got out of my car that several people were pointing and whispering among themselves as they walked towards the church.

As I got closer, I saw a man sitting up against the church wall. He had on a long trench coat that was almost in shreds, dirty pants and a woollen scarf. His toes stuck out the holes in his old worn shoes. He wore a felt hat that was pulled down so that his face could not be seen. I assumed this man was homeless and asleep, so I walked on by and in through the front doors of the church.

Those of us seated in the pews were enjoying a quiet chat when someone brought up the man who was resting outside. Some people snickered and gossiped and wondered about who he was and where he had come from, but no one had bothered to ask him to come in, including me.

A few moments later, the organ started playing and we all joined in the opening hymn. We were waiting for the preacher to take his place when the doors to the church opened. In came the homeless man, walking slowly down the aisle with his head lowered.



God wants us to be optimistic and hopeful and to see the good in each person that we meet. We must look beyond the action and see the person.

People gasped and whispered and made faces. He made his way down the aisle and up into the pulpit. When he took off his hat and coat, my heart sank. There stood our preacher. He was the "homeless man". No one said a word. The room was silent and still.

The preacher took his Bible and laid it on the stand.

"Folks, I don't think I have to tell you what I'm preaching about today."



Changes to Booklists

Please note there have been some changes made to P – 3 Booklists for 2022 to lower costs for families and to accommodate the new flexible learning environments. Stationary items (including pencil cases – Yr. 3) and some text requirements will be ordered in bulk via the school and charged to parent accounts in 2022. Prep to Year 3 families are not required to purchase any stationary items, they will all be provided by the school at the commencement of 2022 and billed to parent accounts.

This year there is no Prep Booklist as the school will purchase all of the required stationary and text requirements.

CLASSES 2022

This term will see staff arrange classes for the 2022 school year. This process is very deliberate and time consuming, but also very important to creating balanced classes throughout the school. I'd like to provide parents with some of the underlying principles that drive our decision making:

- 1. We always aim to create classes that are balanced in need. We consider the academic, social, emotional and behavioural needs of the children when placing them in a class. This is never straight forward and often needs considerable thought. A past practice has been that students nominate a friend, but as you can appreciate this is very difficult to accommodate in a school with 588 students. This practice will no longer be a deciding factor in class placements.
- 2. We consider the gender balance within the group, the body of knowledge that we have gathered on each child and any parent input that may assist.
- 3. We always endeavour to be just, fair and compassionate to the needs of each child.

I invite parents to write to me if you have information about your child that may assist the staff in placing your child. While I always stipulate that parents are not able to request certain teachers and groups of friends, there is often information that, as a school, we are unaware of and would benefit from knowing. Please put your consideration in writing and send to the office addressed to Miss Rostirolla by the end of Week Four, Friday 29 October.

I would also like to stress that our staff know their students very well and will do their very best throughout this process. I urge parents to trust us in making informed decisions that we consider will be the best for each child.

Around the School

YEAR 4 HASS EXCURSION

Students in Year 4 have been studying a HASS unit entitled *Wipe Out Waste*. This unit centres around the key concept of sustainability and guides students through developing the understandings of:

- how the environment supports the lives of people and other living things
- the impact that humans and their actions have upon the environment
- how people now and in the future use environments more sustainably

As part of this unit, we went on an excursion to the Mackay Regional Council's Material Recovery Facility. Our Year 4 classes participated in two educational programs whilst we were there. The Waste Education Program raised our students' awareness of waste issues and they developed a clear understanding of the components of waste minimisation, focusing on the 3R's: Reducing, Reusing and Recycling. The Water Session provided students with information about our local water story, the water cycle and how our water is treated. It also provided students with valuable information on water conservation practices around the home and at school.

We hope that our budding environmentalists came home with top tips that we learnt. Here are some tips to help you make a difference at home.
